Eden Valley itself has no definitive beginning or end, but generally runs from View Road to Ballantynes Square with the intersection of Valley Road and Dominion Road as its central axis from which the suburb radiates out. Mount Eden provides a navigational landmark to the east and Eden Park is located to the west. Dominion Road traverses some of Auckland's early lava flows from Mt Eden and the **Three Kings**; the undulations of the road clearly indicate the location of these flows.^[4]

History

Eden Valley, as a city suburb, originated as farmland before it was subdivided for residential use and commercial development followed. During the 1840's, John Walters, George Nicol and James Brown were early landowners of Eden Valley; holding substantial land for farming and quarrying stone.^[6] Auckland's volcanic landscape was a blessing for the area; the fertile volcanic soil produced a variety of crops (wheat being extensively grown in the 1850's) and the volcanic stone proved to be a suitable material for road making.^[7]

Suburban development in Auckland depended on the availability of land, affordable transport, and desire of the middle class to move out of the crowded inner city. Auckland experienced significant growth in population between 1874 and 1886, putting pressure on the areas closest to the city. The population growth combined with public transportation extending outside of the present city centre in the early 1880's created prime conditions for landowners to subdivide their properties for residential use.^[8] Eden Valley's commercial hub began to develop in the 1880's, but it wasn't until the early 1900's that the development really took off.^[4]

The development and expansion of Dominion Road from 1900 to 1930 mirrored that in Mt Eden village. The principle corner sites were redeveloped with impressive Edwardian two story shops with dwellings above. The number of shops increased in

I'd leave it as both - a lot of Auckland suburbs now have entries. You'll note that the categories it leads to are *Auckland Volcanic Field* - where it's indexed under E for "Eden, Mt." (the volcano), and *Auckland*, where it's indexed under M for "Mount Eden" (the suburb). Same applies with Mount Wellington 9and will soon apply with Mts Roskill and Albert [[User:Grutness|Grutness ^{talk}]] 11:01, 27 Nov 2004 (UTC)





Layering

Browsers may wish to know more about a local:

- personality
- event
- or place

External

External link - to a website outside of Wikipedia.

When adding external links you should consider:

- Is the site content [accessible](#) to the reader?
- Is the site content proper in the context of the article (useful, factual, etc.)?
- Is the link functioning and likely to remain functional?

So, what makes a good Wiki page?

- Clear structure – use headers & sub-headings
- Keeping it concise – use layers and links
- Facts and description only
- No promotion of businesses!
- Providing excellent references and links
- Following Wikipedia rules about content:

Complete

No opinions

Well-written

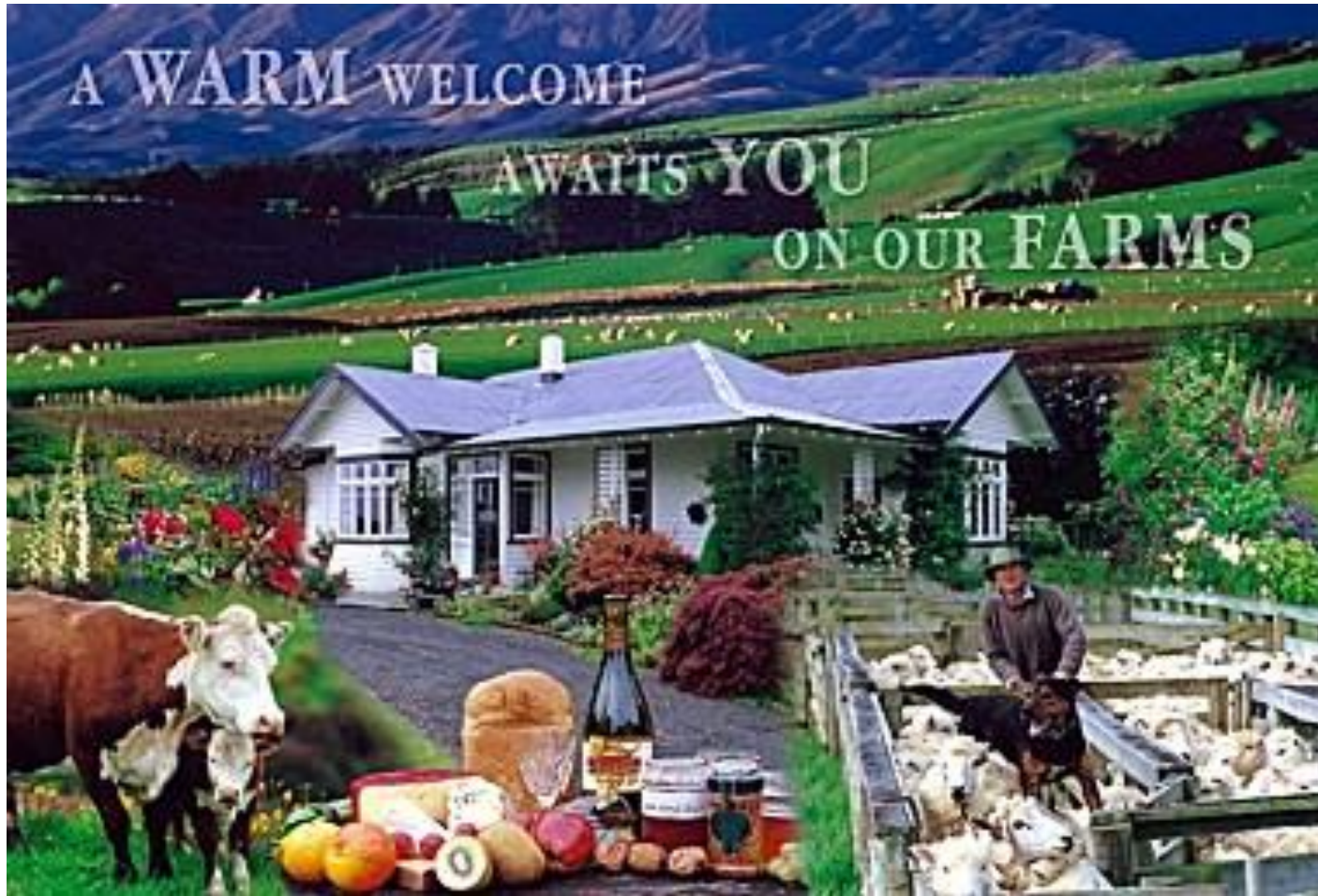

What we liked about the Podcast

- Short piece of music played to attract listeners attention
- The narrator introduces the producer of the podcast
- Authentic kiwi accent

10 Tips when creating a Podcast

1. It should provide listeners with information they can't find elsewhere
2. Episodes of podcasts should appear on a regular basis
3. Make sure the voice on the podcast has a personality
4. A descriptive headline that explains what the podcast is about
5. Short and focused

6. Offer an insight that hasn't been exposed in print
7. Try to keep it under 20 minutes
8. Have "pace and energy"
9. Choose a niche which would "never be accommodated on a mainstream radio station"
10. "Have an intelligent and witty tone"

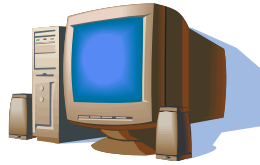
